Peter Stubbs has joined John Tanner's turning class, and made this candle stick holder using pine. Nice work Peter!




This is the bow tie Dave Smith carved and wore to his son's wedding. I think he said he used red gum. Whatever he used I'm sure it attracted a lot of queries

glued the two surfaces together—simple eh??



Malcolm also made this lovely wooden box using Blue Gum for the base and sides and spotted gum burl for the lid. Mal finished after sanding with 3 coats of Kunos oil, sanding between coats. This was a special request from Rhona for a present for a relative.



**Helen Warland** turned her first pens under the guidance of John Tanner using a 'mystery timber'. They turned out great Helen (pardon the pun!) Helen said she learnt a lot with this exercise.



Rick Stanford has carved this dog using a dremel and a piece of pine. I think Rick has drawn inspiration from John Tanner. This is a great first attempt. I reckon it's a Labrador.

Barry Fenning rescued some end grain Spotted Gum from an old house and repurposed it as a cutting board. The end grain was cleverly positioned to form the pattern. Barry completed the board using Red Gum ends and sides.

Barry also fashioned these 2 fire pit pokers using Spotted Gum and a mystery red wood. For the walking stick Barry repurposed a Red Gum fence post.



## **SHOW 'N TELL - OCTOBER**



The star of the show—Neil Henderson's boat, "Plockton" named after a small town in Northwest Scotland. Neil's great aunt used to live there and Neil thinks it is one of the most beautiful places on earth, hence naming this vessel accordingly.





The vessel is a Gannet class boat designed by Iain Oughtred, an Australian who now lives on the Isle of Skye in Scotland -a very eccentric guy who Neil met in July. Neil started Plockton with a set of plans and a pile of timber and many hours later ended up with this very handsome vessel. The external planking has been fashioned from 6ml Brynzeel plywood, the gunnel is Spotted Gum due to its flexibility, and the mast, boom and gaff are Sitka Spruce

(imported from North America). It took 2 months to make the spar alone! The only pieces not made by Neil are the metal fittings, the trailer and sails. I asked Neil how he made the spar cylindrical and he suggested I go to google for an explanation. However he did say he used this handmade sparmaker's

gauge as a guide for a plane to remove corners from the square timber. You then move the gauge around to continue to mark where to draw the lines to plane to.



Jenny Barnes turned this decorative vessel using Huon pine for the lid and Himalayan cedar for the stylish base at John Tanner's home workshop. Jenny experienced the joys of turning a square object having her knuckles

bashed a few times!



After completing the dog carving, **Rick** went on to carve "the Boy" using Bottle Brush. He didn't have a pattern or guide, just 'winged' it from a photo.

Ann Salmon produced these stylish serving boards for future Club sales days. I love the quirky shapes which gave Ann the opportunity to maximise the timber available. Ann had a piece of Spotted Gum, and cut 2 boards from it, topping and tailing the timber allowing her to shape the loop handles.

Helen Warland turned this Ying Yang candle holder using Spotted Gum, and inserted brass holders to hold the candle. This was also turned under the watchful eyes of John Tanner

Rhona Jason Smith made this cedar tea tray, trimming the inner sides with walnut. Rhona has made this for herself and made good use of the cedar grain to form this effective pattern.



**Barry Fenning** made this hanger using Western Red Cedar. The letters were done by hand and the two inserted coins are 1940's penny and halfpenny. The hanger was finished in clear gloss.





Eric brought this fantastic inlayed hall table in for the October Show N Tell, however it was too difficult to get a photo at the workshop to do it justice, so Eric sent this photo in from home. He used Walnut for the top edges and tapered legs, and Silver Ash for the drawers, table centre and inlays at the bottom of the legs. The inlay on the table top is made from 150 small decorative disks cut from both Walnut and Silver Ash to form the pattern of Black Wattle. The amazing thing is that all the timbers used were sourced from the Club's recycled stocks of timber - the legs were a door jam and the top was wall panelling - all repurposed to make this amazing table.

Wooden Jewellery box made by Douglas Laurence for his wife
Dorothy Laurence in 1944 whilst stationed in New Guinea. He was
not a wood worker however had a lot of time in his hands and made
this and a few pieces of jewellery using local timber, pieces of
Perspex from crashed aircraft, pieces of tin and mother of pearl from
the local beaches.

I brought this in for Woodies to see as an item of interest with particular note to the construction of the box.
